The City Banks are free from trouble among themselves, and are generally discounting the full measure of their receipts to regular dealers. There is a considerable number of country bankers in the city, from the interior of this State and New England, looking after their accounts and seeking relief in the way of discounts. They regard the accumulation of five millions of specie at this point since the pressure set in, most of it drawn from the interior, as authoriting a libera policy on the part of the City Banks, as much for the interest of their immediate dealers dependent on collections and the prompt movement of produce to meet their Fall payments, as for the contenience of the country Banks, who have been made poor to strengthen the city, without any yet seeing the practical evidences of improvement here. It is not our province to judge between the parties, but it is certainly a public interest that all the solvent country Banks, particularly in our own State, should be as little embarrassed as practicable at this important season of the year. —N. Y. Times.
