NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—A terrific explosion occurred yesterday afternoon in the "Lancaster" Theater, No. 100 West 4th St. The explosion was caused by the bursting of a steam boiler. The explosion killed 448 feet long, together with two other brick buildings adjoining, occupied at the time by the "Lancaster" Theater. The young woman was taken from the ruins, dead, and seventeen others injured. The cause of the explosion is under investigation.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—An unfounded rumor prevailed this morning that Capt. Herndon and 15 members of the Central American had arrived. The rumor which was spread from Liverpool on the 19th is reported to have passed Cape Horn on Tuesday morning. She will be due here in four or five days.

BOSTON, Oct. 3.—The Concord Railroad bridge at Hooksett and the highway bridge, in the north of the city, have been destroyed by fire. The fire was caused by a short circuit in the power lines. The damage is estimated at \$100,000.
