Tom Franklin's love of country, is well known to all the facts we have often heard alleged, but this article in proof we have never seen until recently in the *Times* of the Americas, where we find that during the last ten years Great Britain and Ireland have dispatched 2,700,000, and Germany 1,200,000 emigrants to the new world, east and west. While France in the same interval has sent abroad quite 200,000. Last year English and Germans amounted to 212,000, and 110,000 individuals respectively. French emigration, according to the latest returns, with the greatest accuracy in our department, is only 16,500. Algerian emigration, which is every possible combination, birth, and even pollution, brought to bear in its favor, has never surpassed 8000 within the year. And yet, it is a well ascertained fact, that the supply of labor in France is equal to the demand! This may be due to the result of the emperor's policy of drawing labor from the country to the great industrial districts where he will be more profitably employed. It would be truly productive, to Paris, the great heart of France. We learn from the aforementioned statistics that the suburban population of Paris has increased since 1851 so large that 68 percent. The Praetor of the Seine calls this, in truth, "a frightful increase." This fact is, in truth, a very correspondent, "somewhat startling for it proves that the number of emigrants has girded itself around the whole of Paris, altogether, in a great measure, dependent for their employment and daily bread upon the public works of the capital, and likely to take place in the source which feeds them. If this were to be the case, the departure of the Seine, says the Praetor, for the small part in France, which is only one-half of one and a half million, of souls in 1851, will exceed more than two millions in 1860—a wholly unnatural state of things, especially when it is considered that, by the last census of 1855, it was found that 25 per cent of the sixty-seven millions of France, an absolute dimension of the population, had place."

Thus Paris is thriving, at the expense of the property of France. This state of things shows some wonderful changes: Between the years 1852 and 1857, 2971 houses were pulled down in Paris and 6583 houses were put up by government. Private speculation has also been busy in building more in rebuilding and beautifying: In the last seven years, 8265 old houses have been replaced by 8187 new ones, larger bairns and basins, and Paris counts 4562 "houses," whose value, indeed, is not to be measured—more before than after the completion of the improvements. Within the last year, 3847 "lodgings," of all descriptions, have been replaced by no less than 3725, and, in the course of the seven years that are passed, Paris has gained nearly 30,000 lodgings, small and great: The cost of these improvements may be better appreciated when we state that the city of Pittsburgh contains probably about 10,000 buildings.

Our *Gazette*—The friends of canal transportation have been holding a convention at Columbus, Ohio, on the 1st of June, to consider the bill in the House for the sale of the canals, and the Canal men naturally became alarmed. The convention signed a memorial setting forth the benefits according to the public from the canals; that their use, individuals or corporations would be in a position to compete, as private interests could be expected to make them in case they should prove pecuniarily unprofitable to their owners; and that such abandonment would bring upon the State a heavier tax than is now required to make up for deficiencies in their revenues. The memorial states, as a significant fact, that the Old and Pennsylvania Canal had been managed so that all business is driven from it, as far as possible, by the ownership of one-third of the stock belonging to individuals interested in railroads, while the State holds one-third only, and is claimed that a like rate would befall the public works generally should they pass under the control of private parties.
