Arrest of a Stage Driver for Robbing the Stage.

For three or four months past complaints have been made in regard to the safety of travel and money on the mail route between Radnor and Clifton, and it was suspected that an assassin was at work on the mail road. On March 12, Captain Corbin, of Wood street, is also of the company. They have their drivers arrested and statio- nary. The engines and horses necessary are purchased, so by the middle of the week the whole concern is in full working order. The mail is now sent in a box which has been bolted to the stage, and has been secured from the water surface in the slate parts, some of which have been burned, and can hardly be used again. The mail is now sent in such quantities and of such quality, to the extent of one thousand dollars per day, that it is now much safer to travel on the Kanawha, Allegheny river, or at the much more dangerous roads than on the roads of the state. Arrival of the Hammelin Flotilla.

New York, March 11.—The Hammelin Flotilla has arrived, with Liverpool to the 27th ult.

The steamship Anglo-Saxon and Vega had

arrived on the 25th, and the steamer Arabic, on the 26th.

The steamer Arabic, to sail on the 2d inst., was expected to arrive on the 23rd to 25th, 1861.
