Public opinion in the United States is certainly very much excited, and a warlike inspiration seems to animate the meetings, which go on increasing in agitation. Under these circumstances people ask them-selves, may not Mr. Johnson endeavor to seek a quarrell with Lord Stanley while England is occupied with the Abyssinian expedition, in order to recover the popularity which he is losing. The United States people, with their minds turned to the prospect of a war with England, would perhaps give less though tto the position of the President. The truth is, that the famous question relating to beligerents will anot bear a close examination. In acknowlredging the Confederates as possessing that character did England act in a different manner from the Government of Washington itself? Did Mr. Lincoln not inti mate to all the powers the establishment of a blockade of certain of the Southern ports? Did he not by so doing treat that city, not as an in-surgent, but as an enemy? Did he not, on several occasions, treat for the exchange of prisoners by formal and authentic deeds executed and ratified by the competent authorities of both parties? In the necessary intercourse between the two armies was the rank of Southern Generals, which they received from President Davis, not recognized? Finally, did Gen. Grant not accept the capitulation of Gen. Lee according to the custom of regular warfare? We might multiply questions of cavil, that the character of belligerents, now contested as of right, was recognized, in fact, by the United States during the entire period of the war. Naturally, therefore, people now ask, what can be the secret motives of seeking a quarrel on such a question.
