Since the Mayor and Police Committee have decided to uniform the police, the question, "Who is to pay for the uniform?" very naturally arises, and is being generally discussed. The Committee have decid-

ed, we believe, that each man shall pay for his uniform, or at least for a portion of it, and of course that is an end of the matter. But the policemen, and many others, think the city should bear the expense. There is a diversity of opinion and neither side of the case is without some argument to sus

tain it. The authorities say that they will furnish the uniforms to the men at contract ice, which will evidently be a much lower figure than policemen could supply them-selves with clothing of that quality, and as ild supply themthe men derive the benefit they should pay for their clothing. This appears to be a plausible and sufficient argument; to be a plausible and sufficient argument, but when met by the argument from the opposite side it loses much of its force. The policemen say they have no objection to urge against the cost of the uniforms; but by the time they are furnished, three months, at least of the term for which they

are appointed, will have expired, but seven months to serve, and should they be relieved from the force at the ex-piration of that time, the clothing will be of no account to them. In addition to this, the cloth of which the uniforms are to be made is of a finer quality, and no

adapted to the rough usage a policeman's clothing is sometimes compelled to clothing is sometimes compelled to undergo, as goods they can purchase for less money. Many of the men comprising the present force, have families entirely dependent upon their namines entirely dependent upon their monthly pay for support, which is hardly sufficient for the purpose, and if they are required to give thirty-five or forty dollars of a month's salary for a new uniform,

of a month's salary for a new uniform, the remaining portion will be insufficient to meet the wants of their families. It is asserted that if the policemen are not willing to pay for the uniforms they can resign, as there are plenty of others

not in the original contract. When the men comprising the present police force were engaged it was with an express under-standing that the contract was for the term of the present Mayor, unless discharged for misconduct, at a stipulated salary, and misconduct, at a stipulated salary, and there being nothing said in the agree-ment relating to uniforms, it was of course understoood that they fur-nish their own clothes, of a quality to suit their own taste or con-venience. By accepting the conditions of this contract, and becoming members of the police force, many of them have, doubt-less, deprived themselves of opportunities to accept other situations, and to discharge them from the force now, for refusing to purchase

from the force now, for refusing to purchase iniforms in accordance with an arbitrary rule of the Police Committee, subjecting rule of the route committee, subjecting them to unforeseen expense, unprovided for in the contract with the city, would be anything but justice. Each officer should pay for his clothing, and they should all be uniformed; but the authorities have no right to violate the contract made with their province and commel them to hear the ex-

appointees and compel them to bear the expense of an improvement by which the cit-izens, and not themselves, are to be benefitted. Why not adopt the principle on which the Government clothes her soldiers? Allow them a stipulated amount per month morrow. for clothing and the authorities prescribe the kind, or furnish it, if they see proper. By adopting this plan, the Mayor would

have control of the uniforms, and if one man was careless and abused his clothes, could give him other and charge the cost to him, and by this means the uniforms would be better cared for, or kept in better condition, and those who derive the benefit from the improvement would have to pay for it.

A disastrous fire occurred in East Birmingham about eight o'clock last evening, by which three frame houses, at the corner of Oliver and Sarah streets, were totally consumed, as was also the furniture, household goods and clothing of the occupants, and a double brick house adjoining on Oliver double brick house adjoining on Oliver street partially destroyed.
