It appears that the license of the pilot of the steamer Vanderbilt was revoked some time since by the Local Board of Steamboat Inspectors for his misconduct in running down the steamer Dean Richmond on the Hudson river, in September last, causing the vessel to sink, the destruction of one or two lives; and placing a large number of passengers in peril of death. The pilot thus deprived of his heense carried his case on appeal before the Supervising Inspector, who, after carefully reviewing the evidence, confirmed the decision of the local board, but finding also that the pilot of the Dean Richmond was likewise blamable, revoked his license as well. In annonnerevoked his license as well. In announcing his decision the inspector takes occasion to express his regret that for such "hardened carelessness" the law provids no more severe penalty than the one he has felt called called upon to inflict." The traveling public will heartly concur in this regret, and demand that a statute be enacted to react the requirements of such above.
