CRUDE-The market, was if anything a shade firmer (to-day, and spot oil may be qnoted a quarter higher-8%c, against 8%c yesterday and the day preceding. We can report 133 bbls at 81/2c, bbls returned; 1000 bbls in bulk at 83/c; and 2000 for June and July at 9%e. Notwithstanding this slight advance and firmer feeling, the trade remains in that unsatisfactory and unprofita-ble condition it has been in for months past; an advance, prospectively speaking, affords no margin to the dealer, for the reason that as soon as there is an advance here, there is a corresponding advance at Oil City, and therefore, the legitimate operator is no bet-ter, off than before-the one is more, than an offset against the other. As we have re-peatedly stated, oil is too much inflated at Deatedly stated, on is too math instance of Oil City for this market, though we do not find fault with our friends up there for squeezing all they can out of it—there is making wrong about that—they are perwrong about that-they are pernothing feetly, right in getting the best price the market will admit of, even if it does work against the interest of the trade here. Nor arc we disposed to find fault with buyers from Cleveland and other points, and spe-cultors, for kceping np prices; if they can afford to pay \$3,10 to \$3,15 per bbl, or even \$5, that is their business, not ours. We only wish to have it understood that Pittsburgh cannot, at present prices, there and here, enter the field with any hope of suc-cess—at least that is the way things look

REFINED-The market for bonded oil is firmer, and prices are a shade better, but sellers are still very scarce. We can report 500 bbls for the first half of April, at 251/c; 1000 for last half of April, at 25%; and it was reported that there was a sale running from May to December, at 26c, and a hall advance for each subsequent month.
