Desicated Eggs.

(From Littell's Living Age.) Mr. Charles Lamont has discovered and ostented a very ingenious process for preparing eggs so that they may be kept for years without change or decay. The process con-dists, as described by, the *Ohomical Nows*, in emptying the fresh eggs from the shell into a long covered trough; a shaft, armed with a series of metallic discs about fifteen or twenty inches in diameter, is made to descend into this trough while revolving, which beats the eggs into homogeneousness, and covers the surfaces of the discs with a thin covers the surfaces of the discs while a thin covering of egg. The discs, still revolv-ing, are elevated from the trongh, and a cur-rent of hot air passed through the covered box, which quickly dries the egg, when a series of scrapers are brought into action, so as to scrape off the egg in the

form of fine this scales or granules, which have the appearance of being crystalized. This process may be repeated as libitum. The preparation thus obtained retains per-fectly all the properties and flavor of the frash egg, and may be used for the various process where briden ever is needed, and purposes where broken egg is needed, and for cooking, by dissolving a little in water, and heating it as usual. One pound is equal to forty-four eggs; 160 dozen eggs, when crystalized or desicated, occupy one cubic

foot. We are glad that this very useful arti-cle of dict has been added to the now long list of preserved articles of food. An enderprising company in New York have, we understand, purchased the invention, and it is now being successfully introduced into the market.
