The reported sales being larger than for some days past, and while the offerings are light and the demand only moderate, prices are without quotable changes. Gold opened at 137 1/4, advanced to 137 1/2, declined to 137 1/4, and closed firm at 137 1/4. A large short interest is still outstanding. The market will decline still further before an advance can be established; the sudden rise, however, in government bonds will soon relieve a large amount of money, and it is probable that an upward movement will be put on foot before the payment of the May coupons commences.

Beef hams dull; sales of 125 barrels at \$3.30 a \$3.50. Cut meats firmer; sales of 370 packages at 11 1/2¢ a 12¢, shoulders 15¢ a 16¢, hams and dress hogs nominal. Lard firmer; sales of 165 hhd at 16 1/2¢ a 17 1/2¢, small lots at 17 1/2¢ a 18¢. Butter firm at 20¢ a 21¢ for Ohio, 40¢ a 42¢ for State. Cheese steady and quiet at 12¢ a 13¢. Bacon—firmer and in fair demand; sales of 750 boxes at 13¢ a 14¢. Cumberland Cut 16 1/2¢, short clear 14 1/2¢, short ribbed 14 1/2¢. Lard—Four closed dull and in favor. Wheat, quiet and a shade lower; rather more disposition to realize. Rye, quiet and firmer. \$1.90 a \$1.95 for western. Oats, quiet but firm at 86¢ for western in store. Corn, dull and heavy at \$1.18 a \$1.21 for new mixed western and \$1.19 a \$1.20 for old mixed western in store. Pork, active and firm with sales of 2,000 head. Mess pork is held at \$27.50 cash and regular, new is held at \$27.50 a \$27.75; sellers option, for May, best, active and firm. Cut meats are very firm with a moderate demand. Bacon is very firm at 13 1/2¢ for Cumberland cut. Lard, firmer, at 16 1/2¢ for fair to prime steam and kettle rendered.
