GROCERIES—The grocery market is more active, and with an improved demand there is a firmer feeling.

TEA—The market is firm and prices are higher for new crop. Choice Young Hsu son \$1.75; fair \$1.60; common \$1.50.

PROVISIONS—Racon is firm and unchanged; we continue to quote at 12c for Shoulders; 15c for Ribs and Cuts.

NEW YORK PRODUCE MARKET. (By Telegraph to the Pittsburgh Gazette.) New York, April 8.—Cotton is a shade easier and rather more active.

CRUDE—The market is quiet and unchanged. There was not a single sale reported in the absence of which we quote spot oil at 85c.

REFINED—The market for bonded oil was a little weak to-day. Answering having declined another quarter of a cent, 42 1/2c.

FLOUR—Flour closed very dull and a shade lower. Wheat quiet with a tendency downward, shippers holding off for further concession in prices.
