Whonever during the services the Virgin Mary was alluded to by the officiating clergymen, she was spoken of as the "Helssed Virgin," or as the "Holy Mother of God." A couple of Boston savans have advanced a theory that has already created some alarm in the eastern portion of our State. The have commenced a crusade against anthracite coal. They assert that the species of coal is unfit for use as a fuel in furnaces or stoyes for warming purposes. The combustion of anthracite, they say, evolves a large quantity of carbonic oxide gas, which is a deadly poison, and that it has been ascortained that cast iron heated to a point below redness is pervious to this gas. The deduction, therefore, is that the air heated by anthracite is easily vitiated by this poisonous gas, which travels with the greatest facility through the iron of the stove or furnace. It is said that one per cent of the gas in the whole volume of a given quantity of air is sufficient to destroy life. That this atmosphere is proved by one of these scientific gentlemen most conclusively. He has invented an electric bell which will detect the presence of this gas in the air. Ten minutes after a fire is lighted in his stove, the tell-tale tinkle is heard. The worst of the matter is that this gas has no smell, and, therefore, a person may be poisoned unawares. The remedy proposed by these scientific gentlemen will hardly be considered satisfactory, we fear. They suggest the substitution of porcelain for iron stoves, but admit that wherever this substitution has been made (as it has in many parts of Europe,) it has been followed by "dangerous epidemics."

If this is the best that can be done about the matter it would have been better not to have shown the burners of anthracite coal what danger they were in at all, "Where ignorance is bliss, "tis folly to be wise." In trying to avoid Scylla they will only fall into Charybdis. We are inclined, however, to doubt whether the dangers of anthracite are not somewhat exaggerated by these scientific gentlemen. Certainly we never heard of many people being poisoned by it. Science is fond of "sensations" some-
