Best commercial paper rules at 7 to 9 per cent. discount, and though there is demand for all the money that is offering at these rates, there is no urgency. At New York the money market is quoted active, and while this is the case at a point so near, there is not likely to be any material relaxation from present rates in this market. The Philadelphia banks are in an easy condition and able and willing to accommodate their customers to nearly or quite the amounts desired.
