Corn farmer and 1 1/2¢ higher; the demand is principally for No. 1, which opened at 94¢, fell back to 93¢ and closed firm at 97¢; sales of No. 2 at 95 1/2¢, new at 95 1/2¢ and rejected at 93 1/2¢. Oats less active and 1/4¢ higher, closing with sellers at \$1.10. Rye quiet; light sales of No. 1 at \$1.10. Barley dull; the demand is almost exclusively for sample lots. Provisions: Lard—New York, sold at \$28.50, 50¢; closing at the outside price. Lard in good request at 10 1/2¢; sellers ask 10 1/2¢. Bulk meats quiet and firm; sales rejected shoulders at 10¢ and rejected sides at 12 1/2¢; sugar pickled hams nominal at 17 1/2¢. New York Dry Goods Market. (By Telegram to the Pittsburgh Gazette.) New York, May 7.—The decline in certain styles of Calicoes and heavy brown Sheetings yesterday has become more general to-day, and has led to some movement in the trade, although the market is still dull and depressed enough. A line of Lawrence C. heavy brown Sheetings have been closed out at 15¢, but the other leading makes are steady at 17 1/2¢. Amoskeag prints are down to 12 1/2¢—per cent off for ten days, but printers assert it costs 15¢ to put the goods upon the market. Lowell are reduced to 11¢. Wamsutta to 10¢, and Pacific Prints have fallen to 10¢. But the leading 2 1/2 prices here noted is chiefly in light unsatisfactory styles, which have to be closed out very soon or not at all, and consequently does not affect the general market, for it is expected prices must recover as soon as the demand becomes more animated.

ASHES—Firm but unchanged; sales of Soda at 4 1/2¢ for common, and 5 1/2¢ for refined. PEARLS at 11¢. APPLES—Firm but unchanged; sales in a regular way at 8¢ to 8 1/2¢ per bbl, as to quality. BUTTER—Continues to arrive pretty freely, and as a consequence the market is weak, with a drooping tendency; sales of prime to choice Roll at 83 to 85¢. EGGS—Cannot be fairly quoted above 20¢, under the influence of liberal receipts. HAY—Is quiet and unchanged; sales from country wagons at \$20 to \$25 per ton. GRAIN—Wheat is scarce and firm, and the price of 400 bushels prime Penna. Red at \$2.15. Corn is held firmly, and the supply is light; sales on wharf and track at \$1.08 to \$1.10. Oats, also, is very firm but not quotably higher; sales on wharf and track at 80¢, and in store at 83 to 85¢. Rye is scarce and firm, at \$2 to \$2.10. No. 1 Barley in market, last sale reported was at \$2.50. DRIED FRUIT—Is firm, with an improved demand; regular sales of Apples at 7 1/2¢, and Peaches at 13 to 13 1/2¢, as to quality. MILL FEED—Sales of Bran reported at \$1.25 to \$1.30 for No. 2, and \$1.50 to \$2.00. POTATOES—Peach Blows are firm at \$1.50 per bushel.
