ALLEGHENY. AN ORDINANCE to authorize the Grading and Paving of Fulton street. Geyer alley, Burke alley, and to authorize the Grading of High street and Henderson street. SEC. 1. Be it ordained and enacted by the Select and Common Councils of the Sity of Allegheny, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the Committee on Streets be and they are hereby authorized and directed to invite and receive proposals for the Grading and Paving of FULTON STREET, from Ohio to Western avenue, and from Ohio to Washington avenue, and GEYER ALLEY, from Endors to Streets, and BURKE ALLEY, from Washington to Liberty streets, and for the Grading of HENDELBENON STREET, from Fedoral to Sandusky street, and the Grading of HIGH STREET, from Edon to Angle streets, and to contract therefor with the lowest and best bidder or bidders, at their discretion.
