General Assembly of the U. F. Church. Special Correspondence of the Pittsburgh Gazette. The General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church met in Argyle, New York, at two o'clock, P. M., on Thursday, the 27th, and was opened by Dr. Dales, Moderator of last year, with a earnest and impressive sermon on 1 Cor. 9: 16: "Ye have a witness in me, I have a witness in you." After the reading and calling of the roll, Rev. James Harper, D. D., was elected Moderator and Rev. A. G. Wallace, Assistant Clerk. On Thursday the Assembly met at 10 A. M. and after the usual opening exercises, the Moderator announced the following Standing Committee and Clerks: Dr. P. Presley, Judicial Committee—Dr. R. Gracey, On the State of Religion—Dr. W. Davidson, On the Course of the Church—Rev. J. B. Bain, On Devotional Exercises—Rev. J. B. Bain, On the Report of M. M. Morrison, On the Report of J. R. Miller, Jamison, On the Report of J. R. Miller, Jamison. The following papers were read and appropriately referred to: Report of the agent to raise funds to aid in building a church in the French settlement, \$4,345 have been contributed with the prospect of the additional amount necessary. Report of the Missionary, Rev. M. A. Wallace, of the congregation in a highly prosperous condition. During the past year twenty have been added to the church, and an effort is being made to secure a new building. There are at present seventy families and one hundred and thirty-two members. A Memorial from the Second Synod of Ohio, asking a modification of the 15th article of the testimony. A paper from the Reformed Presbyterian Synod on the subject of the proposed amendments to the Constitution, and a communication from the Committee appointed by the Philadelphia Convention to report on the proposed amendments of union between the various Presbyterian churches, before their several assemblies. This subject is likely to occupy some attention in the Board of Home Missions. About \$44,000 will be necessary to cancel present indebtedness and meet the expenses of the present year. The afternoon of Thursday was occupied in reading reports. The report of the Board of Home Missions showed a highly encouraging state of matters in the several fields, and was accompanied with an interesting and interesting liberality in this direction. The Board of Publication reported a large increase in sales both in the way of Bibles and other religious works. The Committee appointed last year, to report on the proposed amendments to the Constitution of the Board of Foreign Missions, it was agreed that each evening from 7 1/2 till 9 o'clock, the members of the Board of Home Missions, occupied an hour in describing the operations, wants and prospects of the missions in China, India, Syria, Egypt, and elsewhere. Mr. Watson, from Egypt, also addressed the Assembly. They were heard with deep attention, and no doubt, an increased interest was awakened in these important departments of the Church's work.

Friday forenoon was spent in hearing reports of the various fields. The report of the Dutch Church was introduced and addressed the Assembly, assuring them of the deep interest and warm regard cherished for them by his Church. That if they were to seek Union with any other denomination, it would be with the Dutch Church, which would be their first choice, &c.

FRIDAY, 2 P. M.—The subject of Theological Seminaries occupied most of the session. It was recommended to Presbytery that no student be licensed to preach until he has completed the entire course of study in a theological seminary, commencing on the first Tuesday of September and ending on the fourth Thursday of March. That every student shall be under the care of some Presbytery. That the curriculum of study reported to the Assembly in 1867 was approved and adopted for use in all the Seminaries. of which his son, equally learned and gifted, has been the pastor since his father's death. Mr. Stuart is a man of large and generous impulses, of an amiable and merciful temper, a fine scholar, a ready, pleasant and impressive speaker, one who can engage the attention of his hearers, and kindle in his own breast, and throw upon their hearts and purse strings a few men's while things of him, will call to remembrance that memorable night, in one of the darkest and most anxious periods of the war, when, in response to his appeal, he sought for our soldiers, they poured twenty-two thousand dollars into the treasury of the Christian Commission before the benediction was pronounced.

In his multifarious labors as a Christian and a patriot—but never as a politician—he was necessarily brought into contact with Christians of all the evangelical denominations, and joined with all his heart in their prayers and praises. In fact, such is the temperance of the many that for him to do anything in a half-hearted way would be an impossibility. As far as he could be with a good conscience, he would do the great good, all things, to all men, that he might draw sinners to Christ, draw Christians into love, and fellowship, and draw out the hearts of our brave and suffering defenders of the nation. It was impossible that a man so laboring, so beloved and honored by all true Christians, should not love them in return. He therefore, joined with others in their songs of praise and in commemoration of the death of their common Redeemer. But in doing he became chargeable with a violation of a rule or law of the church of which he was a member, and an effort was made to bring him under trial before the general synod of that church, which met in Pittsburgh this week. No witnesses were called against him, and he frankly admitted that he had done these things. For two days and a half the case was discussed, and the great majority of the members of the synod of the church which forbade the use of instrumental music in the services of God, and also intercommunion in the Lord's supper with Christians of other denominations. On the other side, many churches, and even entire presbyteries, had virtually abrogated that law. Dr. Wylie, Mr. Stewart, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, had done so repeatedly, while worshipping with other Christians, and so said several other ministers. In no case had any meetings of the denomination had hymns been sung, but only in mixed meetings during the last two days of the session. Mr. Stuart was confined to his room at the Monongahela house by a severe attack of spasmodic asthma, which he had contracted during the war. He was unable to be present during the debate, and when the subject became up in other parts, his membership was taken. Dr. Wylie, at the close, made an eloquent appeal in behalf of his friend, and the vote was taken by a majority of 15 to 12, in favor of the resolution condemning him, 23 against it, 15 not voting.

It was in this important case, the moral effect of which will be felt throughout all the churches. Legally, logically, the decision of the court is right, and the law under which it was rendered has not become a dead letter by disuse. In some parts of the country, it seems to be strictly and rigidly adhered to; and the members of the synod spoke and voted accordingly. Mr. Stuart, who has been admitted to the church, and also commended outside of his particular denomination, justifies his conduct in this respect. In the law itself upon trial before the bar of the consciences of Christian men, in which case the volume of inspiration would be the only law. The members of this synod on both sides, acted, as I believe, honestly and conscientiously. Those who voted for condemnation held the law binding, and that they were bound in full force, and that they were bound to regard it as a dead letter, as they do on the other side of that Church, which forbids its members from voting or holding office under this government, and which is still adhered to by another division of the same church. Let me, therefore, on either side of this important case, for each side right as it was given them to see the right. But is this law right? or is it a fetter upon the conscience? It is, in fact, it falls into the category of "those things which are shaken, as of things that are made, that shall remain." (Heb. xlvii. 27.)—a part of the wood, hay, and stubble of which the same inspired writer speaks.
