Colored Men as Voters in the Southern States.

The Albany (Georgia), News, a democratic journal, wrote after the recent election in Georgia, and the Atlanta Intelligencer, another democratic journal, copied without a sign of disapproval, the following reflections upon the results of this first election in that state in which the colored men voted: "Early in the canvass we appealed to the

white people of Middle and Upper Georgia to save Southern and Southwestern Georgia from the horrible fate that threatened. Heavy majorities for radicalism were naturally expected from the black belt, and for ie reasons that induced this conviction, the white settlements were expected to go democratic. We are astonished at the eversal of this natural order of things, and feel so keenly the deep disgrace and sting-ing humiliation, that we dare not indulge our inclination to write."

"At one time we entertained a purpose to change our base, in the event of radical success, and seek repose among the white people in a different portion of the State; but the developments of the election have fastened upon our mind the conviction that the negro is a better man than the white scalawag, and that we should suffer by the wag, and that we should state by the change. There seems to be as much political virtue and integrity among the colored people of Southwestern Georgia, as exists among a large portion of whites in Middle and Upper Georgia, and we proudly assert that they are safer custodians of the franchise. We see no reason longer to oppose negro suffrage. We are disposed to make him a voter in order to rescue the State from carpet-baggers

and scalawage. A Considerable number of white Georgians, it seems, voted the Republican ticket, says the New York Post, while a number of the blacks voted with the democrats; and thereupon follow these words of the democratic writer. It would seem then, that the true qualification for a voter is that he shall vote the democratic ticket.

But the admission of the Albany News is important, because it shows that in Georgia the two parties are already divided upon other issues than that of color.

Democratic Progress in England.

CRIME IN TEXAS—A FEARFUL RECORD.

The official records of the Department of State show the following facts in regard to crime in Texas: For the year 1867, reports from seventeen counties show, 172 murders, assauls with intent to kill, 225. Reports from the Clerks of the District Courts, from fifty-eight counties, show that the following number of indictments were found in those counties from June 1st, 1885 to January 1st, 1995. counties from June 1st, 1886 to January 1st, 1866: Murders, 412; assaults with intent to kill, 437. From December 1st, 1867, to May 1st, 1868, four mouths (since the fauring of Gen.
