PITTSBURGH MARKET.
OFFICE OF THE PITTSBURGH GAZETTE, SATURDAY, June 13, 1888.
The general markets have been dull during the week, which has just closed, the volume of business in the aggregate having been light, and no immediate improvement is looked for. For some articles, prices are higher, but this may be attributed to scarcity, and not to any improvement in the demand; in fact, on the contrary, almost every thing seems to be shrinking in value, and as yet the bottom has not been reached.

GRAIN—Wheat is dull and irregular; the millers report that they are paying but \$2.25 to \$2.30 for Red, while we have a sale of 1 car No. 1 Spring reported at \$2.35. The demand for Onis is better, though; as yet, prices are unchanged; sale of 1 car in bulk at 78c; I do do at 78c, and 500 bushels sacked at 80c. Corn is dull and irregular; sales of cars Shelled reported at \$1.05; I do do at \$1.10; 1 car, 25 bushels, 250 bushels Kar at \$1.08, in bulk at \$1, and will sell readily at \$1.08 to \$1.10. Rye is quiet and unchanged; sale of 1 car at \$1.55. No movement in barley, and none in market.

POTATOES—Sales of 2 cars prime Peach Blooms at \$1.25. New crop are quoted at \$7 to \$8 per barrel, as to quality and condition. HAY—Continues dull, and the supply of baled is largely in excess of the demand; we continue to quote at \$15 to \$20 per ton, the latter only for strictly prime Timothy. MILL FEED—Is dull but unchanged; we continue to quote at \$1.80 to \$2 for Middlings, and \$1.40 to \$1.50 for Bran.

WHEAT—Is dull and irregular; the millers report that they are paying but \$2.25 to \$2.30 for Red, while we have a sale of 1 car No. 1 Spring reported at \$2.35. The demand for Onis is better, though; as yet, prices are unchanged; sale of 1 car in bulk at 78c; I do do at 78c, and 500 bushels sacked at 80c. Corn is dull and irregular; sales of cars Shelled reported at \$1.05; I do do at \$1.10; 1 car, 25 bushels, 250 bushels Kar at \$1.08, in bulk at \$1, and will sell readily at \$1.08 to \$1.10.
