Thirty-four steamers left this port up to May 17th, car-rying freight at unprecedented low rates, and eleven left for Forts Buford, Rice and Starsberg up to June 20th, with covern Stevenson up to June 20th, with govern-ment freights, also at what were considered ruinous rates. Several boats are making their second voyage hence to points above named, and several were loaded a second time at ports on the Missouri for Stevnson and Benton. The idea appeared to be gen-erally entertained that the upper Missouri would be extremely low this year, causing boats so much trouble and delay that their owners would be ruined, or suffer great osses. All such fears have been dispelled. With but few exceptions, the boats arrived at Benton with ordinary if not unusual disat Benton with ordinate vi house the rule. Cargoes have been delivered at their river idestinations with dispatch and good order, always excepting those of the Carrie, Ara-bian, Princess, Bridgeport and Amelia Poe, which steamers were lost on the up ward trip. Each boat carried from 125 to 270 tons. 'Very few' passengers availed themselves of the steamers, some having
