

CITY AND SUBURBAN.

Daily Prayer Meeting, from 10 A.M. to 12 o'clock at the Methodist Church, First street, near St. George's.

Closed.—The Allegheny public schools closed yesterday until September.

Grading.—The grading on Smallman street in the Ninth ward, will be completed next week.

Repairing.—The Second Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church, on Diamond street, is undergoing repairs.

Water Pipes.—A six inch water pipe is being laid on Smallman street, Ninth ward, from Taylor to Moore street.

Paint Street.—The work of repairing Paint street still continues, and it is making a great improvement on that thoroughfare.

Miners' Strike.—With very little notice, miners struck on Monday morning, and by noon had stopped from car No. 9 Citizens Passenger Railway.

Embossed leather, a yard of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, on Liberty and Grant streets, is being enclosed with a stout felling fence.

Wood Street.—The paving of Wood street, and the laying of stones with the New son pavement, will be commenced the second week in July.

Homicide.—A Fatal Stabbing Affray in Greensburg.

A stabbing affray occurred in Greensburg, Westmoreland county, on Thursday evening, which resulted in the death of David Monagan, a young man who resided with Dr. Townsend in the capacity of gardener and man of all work. It appears that Monagan was a weak-minded creature, in consequence of which the boys and young men were continually playing practical jokes upon him, and on Monday evening a party of boys, among whom was William Drum, were standing near the schoolroom where Monagan passed. Drum in a joking manner accused him of stealing a coat, which occasioned being hauled up by the collar, and he was then struck, and provoked him to fight; but some of the party interfered and prevailed upon him to go home. Thursday evening about nine o'clock he was passing along the street again, and observing Drum, he called him, and they began to quarrel, and on the opposite side of the street he would have satisfaction of those fellows, and crossed over to where they were. He struck Drum three or four times in the face, when the latter drew a pocket knife and cut him across the nose, and then struck him on the left side. The wounded man fell, and was removed to a house near by, where medical aid was rendered him. His injury was mortal, however, and yesterday morning, about eight o'clock he expired. Young Drum, his assailant, was indicted, and he and his father, William Drum, who had been in this city for some time, were sent for and left on the morning train.

Meeting of the Allegheny City Republican Executive Committee, and Residence.

The Allegheny City Republican Executive Committee held a meeting last evening in the Treasurer's office, City Building, at eight o'clock. The meeting was presided over by Mr. McDonald in the chair.
