## CITY AND SUBURBAN.

Serious Accident at Alpsville. Jacob Faicht, son of Mr. Faicht, of Alpsyille, a coal miner, suffered a very serious and perhaps fatal injury, yesterday. While at work in a coal pit a large piece of slate fell upon his head, inflicting a deep, transverse cut from four to five inches in length above the left ear, crushing in the skull and lacerating the covering of the brain. There was considerable hemorrage and cozing out of the brain substance. Dr. McMeal was summoned by telegraph and found the boy in a state of semi-consciousness, with almost total loss of speech. His injuries were temporarily dressed, and he was forthwith ordered to Mercy Hos pital, where he was placed under the care of Dr. B. B. Brashear, Surgeon in charge. Chloroform having been carefully administered, Dr. Brashear, assisted by Drs. Ahl, McMeal and McGirr, of the hospital staff, removed several pieces of depressed bone, equal in extent to two square inches or more. The fracture extended forward from the summit above the left ear, as far as the middle of the forehead, and backwards to the middle of the ear. During the opera-tion a considerable quantity of gravel and Pieces of slate were scooped out, together with clotted blood and brain substance. The operation was well borne by the lad, and his condition this evening is promising

Patal Accident.

A fatal accident occurred at Scrubgrass Station, on the Allegheny Valley Railroad, on Friday last; the particulars of which are as follows: Isaac Swift, a young man about twenty years of age, was wo rking at a well owned by his father, H. Swift, of Pittsburgh, and on Friday was drawing oil from the tank and shipping by rail. When the last car was filled, and all but about ten inches of oil taken from the tank, it is supposed that young Swift went into the tank to fix the receiving pipe, and in ascending the tank after completing the wark, was suffocated by the foul air, and fell back into the oil. His body was found on Monday evening, and an inquest held by Jus-tice Marks. The evidence before the inquest produced, substantially, the above facts. The funeral took place from the residence of his father at the Galena House, on Tuesday afternoon.

## . A Brakesman Killed.

Wednesday night an accident occurred at Derry Station on the Pennsylvania Railroad, which resulted in the death of a brakesman named Burke, in the employ of the company. It appears that the de-ceased was coupling cars, when by some accident he tripped and fell under the wheels, which passed over both legs, mu-tilating them in such a manner as to render amputation necessary. The operation was performed, but the patient failed to rally, and died about four o'clock the next morning, a few hours after the amputation. The deceased was an unmarried man and resided in Temperanceville. The remains were brought to Pittsburgh yesterday af-ternoon in charge of Mr. Devore, who had been telegraphed for to bring them.

Disorderly.

P. S. McClusky, Henry Farnier and Wm. Hardy were arrested and fined five dollars each by Mayor Blackmore for disorderly conduct, on oath of C. B. Stein, who alleged that they came to his house, on Fourth street, Wednesday night at a late hour, and demanded admission, which befused caused them to act in a very ing refused caused them to act in a very disorderly manner, calling him names and creating a considerable disturbance. Farnier, in return, made information against Stein and his wife, charging them with keeping a disorderly house, and they were each required to give bail in the sum of five hundred dollars for their appearance at Court. Subsequently a suit for assault and battery was lodged against Farnier, who was required to give bail for trial.
