This is the more surprising since the dealers have but a scanty supply on hand and the investment demand for temporarily earning interest has materially increased with larger cities on account of the general dullness of business and the inability to make capital productive for the time being.

Stocks are firmer, not so much on their improved valuation, but for the want of suitable investmants; it is, however, only the dividend paying companies that arewanted.
