Philadelphia Naturalization Frauds. Ry Telegraph to the Pittsburgh Gazette. PHILADELPHIA, October 7.-Judge Read, of the Supreme Court of this State, has written a letter taking ground against the issuing of naturalization papers in blank by the Supreme Court, and discrediting the statement that papers of naturalization in blank have been issued to the number of Diank nave been issued to the number of over six thousand. He is sustained by Judge Agnew, and also by Judge Wil-liams, the new appointee. The detter says this will be the opinion of a majority of the Court when Judge Williams takes his seat.
