WASHINGTON, November 19, 1868. Gen. Halleck's report recommends the establishment of military posts in the vicinity of the larger tribes of Indians in Alaska as a preventive of war, and the keeping of a vessel of war in those waters. A territorial government he regards unessary. At one o'clock the entire building was on fire, and was destroyed with the excep-tion of part of the middle wing and ma-chinery building. The walls are standing. Six of the female patients were smoth-ered, but their hodies were recovered; Their names are M. Murray, of Wyandotte county; Susan A. Parker, of Licking; Brid-get Brophy, of Columbus; Clara Bradford, Lizzie Herrold and Caroline Conner, all of Athens county. The inmates have been removed to other public institutions.
