That for and during the first period of the first five years after said Company shall commence running their cars upon said road, they shall pay to the Treasurer of said city twenty dollars per year for each car, and three per cent. of the dividends declared; and for the second period of swy years, thirty dollars per year for each car and five per cent. upon all dividends declared: and thereafter the sum of forty dollars per car and five per cent. of the dividends declared.
