Any one who recollects the importance assigned by the late Mr. Buckle to bananas as an element of the food of many will read with interest the following extract we clip from a letter to the Philadelphia Ledger, from Brazil:

The most wonderful production of this and all tropical countries, in my estimation, is the banana and its synonym, the plantain. We have half a dozen varieties, each with peculiar flavor and qualities. Some grov only eight or ten feet high, others twenty. The stalks are from six to twelve inches thick, but almost as soft and succulent as celery. Each of them bears a bunch of bananas, and only one, when it is cut down with a stroke of the spade to secure the fruit and give place to other stalks; and so they grow and ripen perpetually all the year A great traveler has calculated that the plaintain on one acre of ground, will produce as much food as one hundred and thirty-three acres of wheat, or forty-four potatoes. This food is the principal reliance of the poor and a luxury for all.
