PITTSBURGH MARKETS. OFFICE OF THE PITTSBURGH GAZETTE, THURSDAY, JANUARY 14, 1899.

Trade in general merchandise continues quiet and dull, and there is but little prospect at present of any immediate improvement. The demand for almost everything is restricted mainly to supplying immediate wants while so far as prices are concerned, there are no important changes. There is considerable complaint about the difficulty in making collections, and while in a general way money is tight, yet there are cases where parties are able, but who seem disposed to hold back just as long as they possibly can. This is all wrong, as it places parties in a very unpleasant position and causes great annoyance and trouble, and in some cases innocent people have to suffer from the indifference or negligence of others. There is a pretty strong feeling prevailing against the credit system, and some parties are determined to curtail it, even if by so doing they incur the displeasure of a few long-winded customers.

APPLE BUTTER—70 to 80 cents. Apples—in fair demand, and steady with regular sales at \$3.50 to \$3.50 per bushel, as to quality.

BUTTER—There is no falling off in the receipts of Butter as yet, and the market is dull and prices barely sustained. We continue to quote good to prime Roll at \$5 to \$7 cts.

BEANS—\$3.50 to \$3.75 per bushel. BUOY WHEAT FLOUR—Dull at 4c. CRANBERRIES—\$2.75 to \$2.92 per bushel. CHEESE—Dull; 15 to 20.

CORN MEAL—\$1 to \$1.10 per bushel. GARDEN OIL—15 firm and advancing. NEW QUOTE standard white at \$7.40 to \$2.40 in a jobbing way, and but little offering.

DRIED FRUIT—There is a good local demand for Peaches, at 12 to 13 for crates, and 16 to 17 for halves. Apples unchanged at 10 to 11.

DRESSED HOGS—13 to 14c. EGGS—Dull at 20c. PROVISIONS—Bacon is firm with jobbing sales at 15 for shoulders, and 19 for hams. Country Lard, 18 to 18 1/2 and prime, cut, at 19 1/2 to 20. Mess Pork, \$9.00 to \$9.10.

LARD OIL—Is held firmly, at the advance \$1.35 to \$1.38 for No. 1, and \$1.03 to \$1.05 for No. 1.

HAY—Baled is in good supply and dull but unchanged, ranging from \$18 to \$24 for common to prime.

HOMINY—\$6.25 to \$6.50 per bushel. SEEDS—Sales of Cloverseed at \$8.75 to \$9, and Timothy at \$3 to \$3.25. Flaxseed may be quoted at \$2.30 to \$2.35.

SALT—Steady but unchanged at \$2 by the car load, and 10 to 10 1/2 higher for small lots in store.

GRAIN—Wheat continues dull and is seldom mentioned. Oats firm but quiet. We continue to quote at 64 to 65c on track and in elevator, and 66 to 68c in store. The arrivals of Corn have fallen off somewhat during the past few days, though the supply, nevertheless, is still somewhat in excess of the demand; prices remain unchanged at 80 to 82c for Shelled on track and in elevator. Eye is quiet and in the absence of sales, may be quoted at \$1.45 to \$1.50. No movement whatever in barley.

POTATOES—Dull and unchanged—73 to 75c on track, and 80 to 85c in store. VENISON—Very dull; sales of saddles at 25c.

FLOUR—The Flour market remains, as it has been for some time, dull and neglected, though without quotable change. We continue to quote at \$7.50 to \$8.00 for Spring and Winter Wheat, \$8.75 to \$9.25 for Rye Flour, \$7.75 to \$8. The Pearl Mill quote their brands, made of the best Wheat, as follows: Extra Family Flour, in barrels, at \$9.50 and, in sacks, \$9.20 per barrel; Double Extra Family, in barrels, \$10.00, and, in sacks, \$9.70 per barrel; and, in sacks, \$9.50 per barrel; Spring Wheat Flour, in barrels, \$8.00, and, in sacks, \$7.70 per barrel.
