-The Chicago Tribnne, of Monday, says: Private bankers who deal in real estate paper, find a considerable in-crease in the amount offered for sale by parties who desire to realize the money for the purpose of investing again in view of the anticipated advance in prices of real estate. The class of capital, however, which usually seeks this kind of paper as an investment, has not increased in the same proportion as money in the commercial market, and loans on real estate have been as difficult to secure as ever. At almost any time previous to October money could have been borrowed on long time at 8 per cent. per annum on first-class business property, but since then, and now, loans of that kind can not be negotiated at less than 10 per cent, while loans on residence property are made to cost from 12 to 14 per cent. by the addition of a commission to the legal rate of interest.
