APPLES-In good supply and dull but unchanged; sales at \$3 to \$5 per bbl, for common to choice.

BUCKWHEAT FLOUR-Dull and lower; wheat quoted at 3 1/2 to 4 1/4.

CRANBERRIES-Sales at \$18 to \$20. CHEESE-Very firm and the market is almost bare; no quotable Western Reserves and Hamburg at 18c to 20c, and Goshen at 22 to 23.

CORN VAL-3 1/2 to 4 1/4 per bushel. CARBON OIL-Continues firm and advancing and we now quote in a jobbing way at 3 1/2 to 3 3/4 for standard white.

DRIPED EGGS-In firm and in good local demand; sales Peaches at 18 to 19 for halves; Apples at 4 to 4 1/4.

EGGS-Dull sales of fresh packed \$2 1/2 to \$3. FROVINGSON'S-Eagle firm and advancing; we now quote Shoulders at 15 1/2 to 15 3/4; Ribbed Sides, 1 1/2 to 1 3/4; Clear Sides, 1 3/4 and Sugar Cured Hams, 10 to 12; Prime Lard, 20 to 22 1/2; in kegs, Dried Beef, 2 1/4; Mess Pork, 5 1/2 to 5 3/4.

FRESH EGGS-Continues very dull but unchanged; prime Peach Blows offered on track at 70c. Small sales in store at 80 to 85 cts.

HAY-Baled Hay is dull, with a supply considerably in excess of the demand; we continue to quote at \$20 to \$22, for hay as to quality.

HOMINY-\$6.25 to \$6.50 per barrel. HEMP-Sales at \$20 to 22 per ton. GRAIN-No movement in Wheat, Corn and Rye water at unchanged at 17 1/2. Corn continues dull, though there is not much offering and there is no disposition to make concessions in order to effect sales; quoted at 75 for mixed, and 78 to 80 for prime Yellow. Rye is in rather better demand and firmer, and we can quote sales of several car loads, at \$1.46 to \$1.47; we also heard of a sale of 11,000 bushels, taken by a distiller, but the price did not transpire.

PEANUTS-\$4 to 9 cts per pound. SEEDS-Sales of Cloverseed at \$10.00, and Timothy at \$3.50 to \$3.75. Flaxseed-but little offering-quoted at \$2.30.

SALT-Is quiet but steady, and is still quoted at \$2 by the car load. SORGHUM-\$9 to 10 cts.

TALLOW-Is offered at 11 1/2 to 11 3/4. LARD OIL-Firm at \$1.45 for No. 2, and \$1.75 for No. 1.

FEATHERS-Live Geese Feathers quoted at 75 to 82 to the trade, and the usual advance in a retail way.

FLOUR-The market is a little brighter under the influence of the advance in Wheat, but there is no improvement to note in the demand, and no change in price. We continue to quote at \$7.00 to \$8.00 for Spring, and Winter Wheat, \$6.50 to \$7.00; Flour, \$7.50 to \$7.75. The Pearl Mill quote their brands, made of the best Wheat, as follows: Extra Family Flour, in barrels, at \$9.50, and in sacks, \$9.00 per barrel; Double Extra Family, in barrels, \$8.50, and in sacks, \$8.00 per barrel; Spring, \$8.00, in barrels, and \$7.75, in sacks, per barrel.
