The bull operators are discouraged, and have mostly sold out their gold awaiting for a more favorable turn of the market, and towards the end of the month may unite with the bears in bringing down quotations still more. The daily shipments of bonds and other securities have increased so much recently that any shipments of coin will thereby be obviated, and our trade balance so unfavorable, will be entirely liquidated by

the sale of securities. Government bonds which looked dull for a time, on Thursday, were very strong, and advanced about one-half per cent. for new 1865s, and % on 1867s; old 1865s are nearly up to the 1862s, and 1881's command over 114, the highest point yet reached, a large short interest in 1867 forced parties to buy at any price, and the demand from Europe being steadily increased makes dealers

anxious to lay in stock in time. Stocks are dull, and the interest cen ters are entirely in Government bonds; there is no disposition whatever to operate in stocks at present prices, yet parties dealing in them look to much higher prices, and the upward movement may
