The demand for everything, excepting Sugars, Molasses and Syrups, is restricted mainly to supplying immediate wants, as there is an entire absence of anything like a speculative feeling, and prices are without important change. Strong hopes, however, are still entertained of a good Spring trade, and it is probable that it will soon begin to show itself, as the wheat crop is near at hand.

APPLES.—The cold weather has stopped shipments, and as a consequence prices are higher. We now quote at \$1.00 per bush for common to choice. Roll Butter is in better demand, and prices are rather better, ranging from 30¢ to 32¢, mainly at 30¢.
