TANNING .- It has been discovered recently in France that oak wood is almost as well adapted for the tanning of hides as the bark, and that almost any kind will answer the purpose. The principal point to be attended to is to make use of wood cut when it is full of sap, as thereby the greatest amount of tannin is secured The wood may be used without the bark, or wood and bark may be ground up together and applied in the usual method.
