The resumption of navigation has imparted a better feeling in commercial circles, and hopes are entertained that the Spring trade will now open up in earnest. As yet, however, the demand for almost everything is confined mainly to supplying immediate wants, and the volume of business in the aggregate is light, while so far as prices are concerned there is no essential change. Both Grain and Flour continue very dull, and Groceries, also, are weak and Sugars will tend downward. Provisions quiet and unchanged. Apples—Steady with regular sales at 40¢ per bush to 45¢.

STEAMBOATS. FOR ST. LOUIS, KEOKUK, ILLINOIS, AND INDIANAPOLIS. The steamer "Pittsburgh" will leave for St. Louis, Keokuk, Ill., and Indianapolis, Ind., on Friday, March 12, at 10 o'clock A. M. The steamer "Pittsburgh" is a new and powerful vessel, and is fitted with the latest machinery. It is commanded by Captain J. H. Smith, and has a crew of 25 men. RIVER NEWS. Both rivers continue to swell steadily at this point with twelve feet six inches in the channel by the Monongahela, and thirteen feet by the Allegheny marks this evening. The weather has again turned cool, and the thermometer did not at any time rise above 24. The Allegheny was putting out considerable ice last evening, and we expect to see it bank full this morning. None of the towboats will venture out until after the Allegheny ice gets out of the way.

St. Louis, March 11.—Tobacco steady and unchanged. Hemp dull, with sales common at \$1.20, and choice at \$1.25. Corn is quiet and unchanged at 75¢ to 80¢ on a half bushel. Oats unchanged at 65¢ on a bushel. Rye quiet, and unchanged at 85¢ on a bushel. Barley is still quiet at 82¢ to 85¢ on a bushel. Beans are quiet at 1.45 to 1.50 per bushel. Potatoes are quiet at 1.25 to 1.30 per bushel. Onions are quiet at 1.00 to 1.10 per bushel. Straw is quiet at 1.00 to 1.10 per ton. Feathers are quiet at 1.00 to 1.10 per pound.
