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In the experiments referred to, the boiler had a superficial exposed area of two hundred and eighty square feet, and i was found that with the boiler uncovered nearly iffeen cubic feet of water evapo-rated each hour. After the boiler had been covered with a non-conducting ce-ment, the evaporation was at the rate of twenty-one and a half feet per hour. The coal used, and all the other circumstances in the two experiments, were precisely the same.
