

> > Steel Rails.

We find the following in our exchanges, as the expression of the President of the Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baitimore Railroad, concerning steel rails :

"The first steel rail imported has already worn out sixteen iron rails, and we have not now any reason that the latter invoices are of an inferior quality. But there is great fear on my part that railroad companies will themselves tempt steel makers to send a poor article by

buying the cheapest-first cost only considered—as they did with the iron masters. It rests with railroad men to keep




