FARM, GARDEN AND HOUSEHOLD.

An experienced dairy woman publishes some excellent ideas on practical butter-making in the *House and Home*.

She does not believe the assertion of some learned professor who says: "The longer the cream is left churning, the better the flavor of the butter." She says, butter is contained in the cream in minute cells, and at a certain temperature, joined to its rapid beating, those cells break, and the butter "comes." Five or ten minutes of the rapid motion will cause the sacs to break equally as well as two hours of the same elbow exercise. Neither does the two hours' hard work increase the quantity or flavor of the butter. In churning, however, it is very important not to cease the agitation too soon when the butter first begins to "come." Some commence to "gather" before half the cells have broken, and so leave a large portion of butter in the curd. It is well to keep up the brisk agitation until the butter begins to gather of its own accord, and the buttermilk separates completely from the milk.

From our own observation, it is important to not have the cream too sour, as well as to have it the right temperature, in order to have the butter "come" quickly.

The depth of milk in pans should not be over two and one-half inches; and the milk should be skimmed just as it begins slightly to clabber. If, in skimming, the cream is placed in a jar, and with other cream previously skimmed, the whole should be stirred up together when an addition is made, so as to insure the acidity to the mass, when afterwards the contents of the jar are poured into the churn.

It is a good plan in cold weather, after milk has "set" twenty-four hours, to place the present amount of churning water on the stove, and let the steam warm it, so as to cause the cream to "crinkle" a little, taking care not to let the milk skim.

The pans then placed on the milk shelf for twenty-four hours longer, when the cream is skimmed off—thick as a "leather apron." This is the English method of procedure.

It is a summer—summer is the time to make pork; making it in winter is much like running a boat against wind and tide; it requires too much force to keep up the animal heat. If hogs have plenty of grass in summer, and about half the corn they will eat, they will fatten rapidly; and my belief is that three pounds of pork can be made from less grain in this way than in any other.
