The representatives of the National Division of the Sons of Temperance of North America, are now in session in this city. Many, accompanied by members of their families, proceeded to-day to the East Room, in accordance with previous arrangement. The visitors, about two hundred and fifty in number, formed in a semi circle, when the Presisaid those present were from all parts of the Union and British Provinces, and they came to pay their profound respects to the Chief Magistrate of the nation. In granting this interview they looked upon the President as recognizing their motives in the interests of humanity. Dr. motives in the interests of humanity. Dr. Lee, of England, was introduced. He expressed the hope that the President's Administration would have the effect of strengthening the friendship between the two greatest nations of the earth, that the cause of freedom as well as temperance and morality may be preserved. The President bowed, but made no verbal reply. The visitors then approached in line and were introduced and shook hands, and as the ceremony and shook hands, and as the ceremony was completed he retired.
