Felicien Mallefille, a romancer and dramatist, author of the 'Memoirs de Don Juan Les Sept Enfants de Lara," and a comedy entitled "Le Cœur et la Dot," which, since 1858, has held a position upon the boards of the Comedia Francaise: M. Auguste Lacausade, a dis tinguished poet, chevaller of the Legion of Honor, and principal editor of the Revue Europeenne; M. 




