

PETROLEUM MARKET.

There is but little change to notice in the oil market. The stagnation which has prevailed for some time past still continues, and what is worse still there are indications at present of any immediate improvement. The great trouble lies in the inequality of prices, and until prices are equalized, the dullness which now exists must of necessity continue. It is true, the great majority of our refining establishments are still in operation, but it is also true that they are engaged in working up old contracts; no fresh sales are being made, nor is it likely that there will be a return to the manufacturer, by so doing. Unless there is a radical change in prices, there are many who believe that they will be obliged to suspend operations, and were it not for the fact that many of them are sold ahead, there is no doubt but that sales of oil would be very small. It is a good thing for our refiners that they are not "let down," and our refiners who entertain this view of the matter, as in that event one of two things would occur, and this is the advance of crude oil, and this is generally what is desired by the trade.

On the 6th of August, 1899, Crude sold at 14 1/2 on spot; 14 1/4 for August and September; 13 1/2 for all year. Refined at 14 1/2 for August and September, and 13 1/2 for all year. At the present time Crude is quoted at 14 1/2 on spot, and 14 1/4 for August and September. This month's receipts are estimated at 1,000,000 barrels, and it is expected that the total for the year will be 10,000,000 barrels. The market is generally quiet, and there are many who believe that they will be obliged to suspend operations, and were it not for the fact that many of them are sold ahead, there is no doubt but that sales of oil would be very small.
