The clog in the oil business noted from day to day for some time past still continues, and what is worse still there is no prospect of any immediate improvement. Our refiners have their hands tied, being unable to move in the present condition of affairs, as the inequality in prices renders it impossible for them to entertain fresh negotiations, and it looks now, unless there is a radical change in the situation, as if they would have to suspend operations, as scon as they have filled their old contracts. This is to be regretted, especially at this season of the year, but it would appear just now that there is no help for it. Possibly a movement of this kind would bring about the object so sought for, and it is also possible that the trade may right itself without this, at least it is to be hoped so, though it must be conment.
