PITTSBURGH MARKETS. OFFICE OF PITTSBURGH GAZETTE, TUESDAY, Sept. 7, 1893. The general markets are quiet and devoid of anything deserving of special notice.

APPLES—With an increased demand and diminished arrivals, the market is firmer and prices better, ranging from \$2.50 to \$3.50 per bushel.

GRAIN—The mills are receiving considerable wheat, while dealers are getting but very little prices from Europe, and the sudden demand for money.

GROCERIES—The market, with the exception of sugars for which there is a demand, is dull with a light volume of business in the aggregate, and no change in prices.

PROVISIONS—The demand is fair, but unchanged. Bacon, shoulders, lard, ribbed sides, 18 1/2; Clear do, 19 1/2; Sugar in drums, 21 in half boxes, and 21 1/2 in barrels and kegs.

PEACHES—We can report sales all the way from \$2 to \$3 per box, the latter figure for fancy up to the demand.
