Trade is languishing here to some extent in consequence of the discrimination made against us some of the leading railroad companies, and until a remedy is applied no improvement can reasonably be expected. What Pittsburgh merchants want is an equitable and fair tariff of freights, so as to be enabled to ship from here to the seaboard, and to this they are certainly entitled. If a grain dealer cannot sell here, it is very important for him to have an outlet; at present rates he cannot ship he has no outlet, but is obliged to hold in store or elevator until such time as he can sell to the local trade. Now it is well known that the local trade of Pittsburgh does not amount to much, and that there is not sufficient scope here to afford our dealers any chance to extend their business. It is asserted, and it is no doubt true, that it cost nearly as much to bring a car load of grain from Newark or Columbus to Pittsburgh, as it does from Cincinnati, notwithstanding it is only about half the distance.
