Secretary Cox was a General in the Army of the Po-tomac, and assumed command of the 9th Corps after Reno was killed at South Mountain. At Middletown large crowds surrounded the open carriage of the President, greeting with cheers, and not forgetting Sherman in their welcome. Minis Gen. Sherman in their welcome. Minia-ture flags and handkerchiefs were waived by the ladies, and the bells of the village were rang. A reception equally enthusiastic was given at Boonsboro, and also at Keedysville. A large orowit of residents of the vicinity were in waiting.
