"The ordinary temperature of new milk is from 65 to 70 degrees. To the but when viewed through a microscope an infinite number of minute globules. appear, which contain the only part, or the dairy, these only particles, being the will patronize them. hightest; gradually rise to the surface and form the cream. But when milk is exposed to the atmosphere, the oxygen absorbed by it slowly changes the milk sugar into what is called lactic acid. This acid causes the caseine or curd to coagulate, prevents the further separation of the cream, and the milk becomes sour .--The curd of sour milk is always found to contain more or less butter; sometimes as much as two per cent., or one half the whole quantity contained in the milk; (the best milk seldom contains five per cent.) This arises from the fact that the lactic arid is formed before all the buttery particles have had time to rise to the surface. Hence, the longer we can keep tain."


