Agriculture—Its Position and Claims.

Agriculture is as old as man, and twice as honest; it is the parent of the arts, and has never given its children stones for eggs; it has fed and clothed every nation and tribe and individual of the human race, from Adam downwards; and never has grumbled, never has fallen short of its promises, and never has betrayed its trust.

As far as any relation exists between the past and present, we can safely say, that the present has only gained. There was never before so good a plow upon earth as at present. Herculaneum and Pompeii have revealed in their buried treasures more beautiful vases and ornaments than modern art can produce; but nowhere, not even in ancient Nineveh itself, can we find a better hoe or scythe or reaper, than can be seen at any of our farmers' doors.

The horse convention at Springfield, called together as many individuals, and as much of the talent, wit and learning of the land, as any convention, perhaps, which was ever held in the Union, on any occasion whatever. Four or five hundred dollars is at present offered in the city of Albany in premiums for domestic fowls, twenty-five dollars for a single pair.

And what, at the present time, are the claims of agriculture upon the community? Simply, what the community are every day giving to it. It asks that the press shall be open to its interest, and the press has nobly responded to the call.

It asks that young men shall be thoroughly trained, not only in the practice, but the theory and science of farming; and our academies and lecture rooms and colleges are beginning to open their doors for the instruction of the eager multitude.

It asks that agriculture shall take its place, not only on a level with other handicrafts and laborious pursuits, but with the learned professions, and we believe that ten years will not elapse before the proudest exclamation of a free, intelligent man will be 'I am a farmer.'

Office to Procure Soldiers' Land Warrants. By a recent Act of Congress it is enacted, That each of the surviving, or the widow or minor children of deceased commissioned and noncommissioned officers, musicians, or privates, whether of regulars, volunteers, rangers or militia, who performed military services in any regiment, company or detachment in the service of the United States, in the war with Great Britain, declared by the United States on the eighteenth day of June 1812, or in any of the Indian wars since 1790 and each of the commissioned officers who was engaged in the military service of the United States in the late war with Mexico, and shall be entitled to lands as follows:

Those who engaged to serve twelve months or during the war, and actually served nine months, shall receive one hundred and sixty acres; and those who engaged to serve six months and actually served four months, shall receive eighty acres; and those who engaged to serve for any or an indefinite period, and actually served one month, shall receive forty acres. Provided, that wherever any officer or soldier was honorably discharged in consequence of disability in the service, he shall receive the amount to which he would have been entitled if he had served the full period for which he had engaged to serve.

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
