By the 43d section of the "Act for the regulation and continuation of the Common School System," passed May 8, 1854, it is made the duty of the Superintendent of Common Schools, to give notice by publication in two newspapers in each county for three successive weeks, to the School Directors of the several counties, that they are to meet in convention at the Seat of Justice of the proper county, on the first Monday of June next, and select *visu voce*, by a majority of the whole number of Directors present, one person of literary and Scientific acquirements and of skill and experience in the art of teaching, as County Superintendent for three succeeding school years.

The School Directors present in such convention or a majority of them, shall at the same time fix the compensation of the County Superintendent, and immediately after such election, the President and Secretary of the convention shall certify to the Superintendent of Common Schools, at Harrisburg, the name, amount of annual compensation allowed, and the Post Office address, of the person who may be elected County Superintendent.
