OFFICE TO PROCURE Soldiers' Land Warrants.

By a recent Act of Congress it is enacted That each of the surviving, or the widow or minor children of deceased commissioned and noncommissioned officers, musicians, or privates, whether of regulars, volunteers, rangers or militia, who performed military services in any regiment, company or detachment in the service of the United States, in the war with Great Britian, declared by the United States on the eighteenth day of June 1812, or in any of the Indian wars since 1790 and each of the commissioned officers who was engaged in the military service of the United States in the late war with Mexico,
