These were all received in one quarter. They were regularly advertised as all other letters are, but not being called for by their owners, are now returned unopened to the countries from whence they come.

A resolution has passed the Senate of Massachusetts, with only one dissenting vote, making foreigners ineligible to office in that state in future.
