Be it enacted by the Chief Burgess and Common Council of the Borough of Stroudsburg, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,

And further, If any persons or persons owning property on the south side of said Elizabeth street, from said Jacob street to the lower corner of said lot now occupied by John Boys, refuse to have the same graded, paved and curbed in pursuance of the above enactment, and within the time therein specified, the Town Council, after the expiration of the said time, will have the same done at the expense of said property owners, according to the Act of Assembly, in such case made and provided.
