

PENNSYLVANIA ELECTION—OFFICIAL.

We subjoin a full and accurate table of the vote for Supreme Judge and Canal Commissioner, at the late election, made up from the official returns in the State Department. It will be seen that the majority for John M. Read is 26,986, and for Wm. E. Frazer 26,290. At the election last year Gov. Packer carried the State over Wilmot by a majority of 42,751; and over Wilmot and Hasselhurst combined, by a majority of 14,619. There has been considerable of a popular revolution since last season:
